Danson ECO Council

The Danson Eco Council have been meeting each half term to discuss eco-friendly and environmental issues within the school.

As a school, we participate in the Eco-Schools initiative whereby global issues and concerns like climate change are broken down in ways that our pupils can understand. Our school and our pupils then take small steps in our everyday lives to improve bigger issues. There are ten overarching Eco-Schools topics and as a school we partake in mini-projects that tackle issues within these.

The ten topics are: Biodiversity, Energy, Global Citizenship, Healthy Living, Litter, Marine, School Grounds, Transport, Waste and Water.

In the autumn term, the Eco Council completed an audit, called an Environmental Review, of where we are as a school across the ten topics. This then formed our action plan and areas of focus for the rest of year. Whilst we often teach lessons that address these areas, either directly or indirectly, the role of the Eco Council is to consider how we can make an obvious difference in at least three of the topics.

As part of our work to become an accredited Green Flag School we are encouraging all our pupils, parents and staff to take part in the *Big Garden Birdwatch*.

The weekend of the 24th-26th January is a big weekend for the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds. It marks the RSPB's annual Big Garden Birdwatch. Over the weekend, hundreds of thousands of households take part by spending an hour watching out for the birds that land in their garden, balcony or local park. Love of Learning

It was a genuine pleasure for myself and the leadership team to pop into lessons this week and see the fabulous learning going on across the school. Reception were AMAZING in their phonics lessons and could showcase their blending and segmenting. Year 1 were avid Geographers describing the weather in different seasons and Year 4 were using their Geography and scientific skills and knowledge to identify key issues impacting bees within our environment. Year 3 were exploring multiplication and division and using their knowledge of arrays from year 2 to support their learning with Cuisenaire rods to understand commutative Law and equivalency. Year 2 were investigative scientists looking at properties of materials and creating conclusions from their investigations. Year 5 were enthusiastic Historians who were interpreting sources to understand more about crime and punishment in the Anglo-Saxon times. Year 6 were busy planning their diary entries, considering their audience and purpose and how to convey the character they were writing as. Children you should be SO PROUD of yourselves!!

Year 2-Great Fire of London Workshop

The children then re-enacted what it would have been like to walk through Pudding Lane.







Year 6 Greek Workshop

On Thursday 9th January, Year 6 enjoyed an immersive workshop to introduce our new topic on the Ancient Greeks. Over the course of the day, we learnt about this incredible civilisation. This included finding out about the city-states and how they fought against each other, but also how they worked together against the Persians. The children took part in battle enactments, learnt about some famous Greek myths, played the Ancient Greek game of Petteia, solved the Archimedes puzzle, Stomachian, and experienced the Ancient Greek Olympics. The day provided a wonderful introduction to our topic and helped us develop our background knowledge. The children now have a real thirst for finding out more about how the Ancient Greeks have influenced life in the modern world and the legacy they have left behind.







Year 4 Egyptians Workshop

To conclude our topic on the Ancient Egyptians, we enjoyed a creative workshop full of amazing practical experiences linking to our learning from the Autumn term. This included learning how to make canopic jars, tomb painting, writing hieroglyphics and practicing the process of mummification. Throughout the day, we were given roles as part of the Egyptian civilisation. Some of us were royalty or part of the royal court, while others were the medjay (police) or even slaves! The afternoon consisted of preparing performances to show the pharaoh at the festival before a banquet of bread, cheese, grapes and 'wine'. We had a fantastic day consolidating and applying our historical learning to hands-on activities.










Year 5-Trip to the Greenwich Royal Observatory

Safeguarding-E-Safety- Supporting your child online



Talking about some online issues can be difficult, and some topics can be particularly awkward; for you and your child! We have put together these questions to help you start an initial conversation, so you have a better understanding of what they do online and how you can protect them.

Reassure your child that you are asking these questions because you are looking out for them; you know the internet is a great place and you just want to be assured that they are using it safely.

1. What apps/games are you using at the minute?

This will give you a good overview of the types of things they are doing on their devices and what they are interested in. Remember, they might not tell you everything they are using. New apps and games are released regularly, so have this conversation often to keep up to date with your child's activities.

2. What websites do you enjoy?

Similar to the first question, this will help you discover what your child is doing when they are online. Additionally, ask them what they do on these websites.

3. How does this game/app work? Can I play?

Show a genuine interest in what they are doing. Whilst you are playing a game or using an app with them, it might highlight something that they don't necessarily think is a danger to them. If they act like they don't want to share their activities with you, question why.

4. Do you have any online friends?

Children can form positive relationships with people online, but they may not fully understand the difference between a friend and a stranger. You could make the question more specific to your child, for example, "have you met anyone online that you like to play games with?" They may not want to share this information with you, so ensure you teach them about healthy relationships.

5. Do you know where to go for help?

You may be their trusted adult, but your child may find it difficult to tell you certain things. Reassure them of the importance of being able to share with you any concerns or questions they may have about being online or programs they have used.

6. Do you know what your personal information is?

Your child may already know what their personal information is but they might not think about how it can be shared. Have a conversation about what personal information is and how this can affect them if it is shared.
