# Phonics and Early Reading at Danson



# The importance of early reading

- ▶ It promotes a love of reading.
- ▶ It introduces children to a wide range of vocabulary.
- ▶ It supports children's communication and language skills.
- Being read to improves children's concentration and focus.



#### What is Phonics?

- Phonics is the method of teaching reading through the identification of sounds and graphemes.
- We use a systematic synthetic phonics approach for early reading.
- In phonics we use the word *grapheme* to talk about the letters on the page and *phoneme* to talk about the sounds those letters represent.
- After, they will learn how sounds can be put together (blended) to make words. E.g. 'm-a-t'.



#### What does a phonics session look like?

- ► A daily phonics session is 45 minutes, however in Reception we start with 10 minutes and increase the time throughout the Autumn term.
- Phonics starts at 9am for Rec, Y1 & Y2. We stream the children across these year groups depending on their phonics/reading ability. The groups are revised each half term.
- We prioritise reading here at Danson and use a 1:1 tutoring programme as part of the 'keep up, not catch up' to ensure that all children make progress.
- ▶ We focus on 'pinny time' using the speedy sounds throughout the day to consolidate the sounds that the children know.








# What does a speed sound lesson look like?



Introduce the new sound




Speedy sounds

- ► We use green words to help children decode and read words.
- ▶ We use the saying 'special friends, fred talk, read the word'.

# Storybooks

After the Spring Term, the children will be introduced to storybooks as part of their phonics session.



Children will spend time with their partner in phonics taking turns to read and building on their fluency.



# Phonics videos on Google Classroom

We post videos each week on Google Classroom as part of the children's home learning.

Please take time to go over these with your child at home to consolidate the sounds that they have learnt that week.







# Reading at home



- In your child's book bag, they will bring home a sound book and a free choice book.
- We encourage you to comment in your child's reading record about your child's reading journey.

E.g., Sam enjoyed reading his book this evening. He struggled on the words '...' and '...' but otherwise fluent, accurate reading. We discussed what happened in the story and what Sam enjoyed about







#### What can you do?

- Listen to your child read the same Storybook again and again
- Encourage them to use 'Special Friends', 'Fred Talk', 'read the word'
- Discuss the story and encourage their storyteller voice.
- Read to your child
- Ask lots of questions and share opinions.
- Be a talk-a-lot family.



# 10 things your child learns when you read aloud stories and poems every day

- 1. Sustain attention
- 2. Appreciate rhythm and rhyme



- 3. Build pictures in their minds from the words on the page
- 4. Understand humour and irony
- 5. Use new words and phrases in different contexts and later in writing
- 6. Learn new vocabulary and knowledge of the world
- 7. Think about characters' feelings and use appropriate voices
- 8. Follow a plot with all its twists and turns
- Understand suspense and predict what's about to happen next
- 10. Link sentences and ideas from one passage to the next



# Top Tips - Storytime

- 1. Make it a treat
- 2. Make it a special quiet time
- 3. Show curiosity
- 4. Read story once without stopping
- 5. Chat about the story
- 6. Avoid testing with questions
- 7. Link to other stories and experiences
- 8. Read favourites over and over again
- 9. Use different voices
- 10. Love the book






#### Reading for Pleasure
